


PARTNERSHIP FOR COLLEGE COMPLETION



AFFORDABILITY STUDY FINDINGS IN BRIEF



POLICY

17 years of disinvestment has given Illinois affordability issues
Disproportionately affected rural, Black, and Latinx students

Black Students

Black student enrollment is at crisis levels, and wealth gaps contribute to both access and debt issues

Latinx Students

Latinx four-year degree increases have not kept up with student growth, and debt aversion plays a role in access and outcomes

Rural Students

Rural students are divided by ability to afford 4-year college, but those attending often can't afford to return Enrollment crisis for black students

- >11,700 fewer black students from 2007-2017
- Disproportionate Black student enrollment in for-profit colleges
- >Universities receiving more resources enroll fewer Black students
- Declining demand for public universities receiving less resources Gaps in completion and transfer

Access **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

Latinx students more likely to attend community college
➢ More than 2x growth in community college enrollment and degrees
➢ Population outpacing bachelor's degree completion by 40%
➢ Latinx community college students are about 30% less likely to transfer than White students

Rural students largely attend public colleges and universities

>Lower bachelor's degree completion, higher associate degree completion

Disinvestment has led to high costs

- ≻50% higher net price than Midwest average
- ≻IL's less costly 4-year colleges and universities are not racially representative
- ➤1.5 million MAP grants suspended since 2002

Black and Latinx students have less ability to pay

Example: Household wealth for families with \$36k-\$61k

➢Black households: \$11,000

≻Latinx households: \$8,600

≻White households: \$86,100

For rural students, reversed but high opportunity costs

Policy Recommendations

Equity in higher education funding
 Fully funded need-based aid program
 Phase-out MAP from for-profit institutions
 Provide students with completion grants
 Improve developmental education placement and delivery models
 Implement a direct admissions program

for all public colleges and universities



DIRECT ADMISSIONS TO IMPROVE EQUITY

- Outcomes from early implementers suggest
 - Increase enrollment
 - Increase college-going
 - Positive correlation with college enrollment behavior for Black and Latinx students
 - First generation college students are positively influenced by direct admission letters

OPPORTUNITIES TO IMPROVE EQUITY IN IL

House Bill 26 (Rep. Thapedi/Sen. Collins)

- Proactively send letter of acceptance
 - Include information on local community colleges
 - Reminder to fill out FAFSA
 - Reminder that they can still apply under the normal processes
- Consider test optional/test blind practices
- All public universities participate
- Invest in retention practices and programs for Black and Latinx students and first generation college students
- Fully fund the Monetary Award Program (MAP)
